Summary:

The Nebraska ICAP Team got a call asking about wearing a surgical mask over a NIOSH approved N-95 for their procedures.

Key Takeaways:

- This is not an approved use by NIOSH for any respirator
- This strategy should only be used for emergency extended use for contingency PPE use
- More is not always better when it comes to PPE
- Face shields can replace the use of a surgical mask as droplet protection
- The use of a surgical mask over a N95 respirator does not improve the fit or seal of the respirator and may actually impact the fit causing failure
- Can be bothersome or uncomfortable and make it hard to breathe but there is no evidence of health issues arising from this
- Respirators should be handled as if the external surface is contaminated regardless of the use of a surgical mask or face shield being worn over them, there is an increased risk for personal transmission
- This may be a cost burden to some facilities by needing to use double the masks
- If the supply chain is insufficient to support conventional use of respirators, you may need to practice this to extend the life of a respirator.
- The CDC and FDA have recommended moving back to normal PPE use, 1 respirator for 1 patient encounter
